

# Executive summary - Whakarāpopoto ā kaiwhakahaere

- 1. The Chateau Tongariro (the Chateau) is a category 1 Heritage New Zealand Pouhere Taonga listed building in Tongariro National Park that was previously operated as a hotel. The former lessee, KAH New Zealand Limited (KNZ) recently closed the hotel and terminated their lease with us.
- Under the terms of their lease, KNZ yielded the Chateau to us when they terminated the lease. We are now responsible for the security, maintenance, and operational management of the Chateau.

- 4. There is a Carl Kahler painting of the pink and white terraces in the Chateau. While this painting is owned by KNZ, we understand they intend to sell it, either to the Crown, a future operator, or at a public auction. We are seeking your direction about how to proceed regarding the Kahler painting and other items with heritage values. We recommend you instruct us to work with the Ministry of Culture and Heritage (MCH) to identify public museums who may wish to acquire the Kahler painting.


# Purpose - Te aronga

1. The purpose of this briefing is to update you on the termination of the lease for the Chateau Tongariro and seek your direction on matters of high risk or public interest.

# Background and context – Te horopaki

- 2. The Chateau Tongariro (the Chateau) is a category 1 Heritage New Zealand Pouhere Taonga listed building at the entrance to Whakapapa Village in Tongariro National Park that has been operated as a hotel since 1929.
- KAH New Zealand Limited (KNZ) have operated the hotel since 1991 under a lease granted by us, when they purchased the Chateau from Tourist Hotel Corporation (THC), a Crown-owned entity. KNZ purchased the Chateau as a going concern, taking ownership of the buildings and improvements (collectively referred to as the improvements) along with the hotel chattels.
- 4. KNZ's lease expired in 2020. Prior to the expiry of the lease, we attempted to negotiate a new lease with KNZ, but were unable to reach agreement on the terms of a new lease. When their lease expired, KNZ moved to a monthly lease agreement, with a 30day termination clause.
- 5. On 31 January 2023, KNZ advised us they were closing the Chateau on 5 February 2023, due to seismic risks identified in a Detailed Seismic Assessment they commissioned. They also cited the uncertainty about the future of Whakapapa ski field due to Ruapehu Alpine Lifts Limited entering voluntary administration as a factor in their decision. KNZ formally notified us of their intention to terminate the lease on 6 February 2023, with the termination taking effect on 9 March 2023.
- As well as the Chateau building, the lease covers 24 additional buildings located around Whakapapa Village, including the tavern, a café in an historic building, and staff accommodation.
- Under the terms of the lease, all improvements were yielded to the Department, with no compensation, on the termination of the lease on 9 March 2023. We have worked closely with KNZ staff to ensure a smooth transition from an operational perspective.

Transition of the Chateau Tongariro






# Chattels and items with heritage value, including artwork

24. KNZ have left the hotel chattels, including furniture, bedding, appliances, and artwork, in the Chateau. We have advised KNZ that we are not taking responsibility for any loss or damage to these items while they remain in the Chateau.

- 25. KNZ have identified chattels artwork and other items with heritage value (heritage chattels). They are interested in reaching an agreement for either the Crown or a new operator to purchase these items so they can remain at the Chateau. It is very unlikely a new operator will be in place before KNZ wants to realise the value of the heritage chattels.
- 26. We are aware there is public interest in the heritage chattels, and that some items may have been donated to either THC or KNZ by members of the public. KNZ purchased all THC's chattels as part of the sale in 1991, and therefore own all heritage chattels.
- 27. The Ministry of Culture and Heritage (MCH) have reviewed the list of heritage chattels. After consulting with experts at Te Papa, they have advised the only item they consider holds significant heritage value is a painting by Carl Kahler of the pink and white terraces. We would require a valuation to understand the likely value of this painting. The highest price reached for a Kahler to date that we are aware of is US\$826,000 in 2015.
- To keep the Kahler painting with the Chateau, the Crown would need to consider purchasing the painting.
- 29. KNZ will look to sell the heritage chattels that are not of interest to the Crown. Te Papa have indicated they may be interested to purchase the Kahler painting before a public auction if it is determined to align with their collection development priorities, noting that it would need to go through Te Papa's normal acquisition process. Other public museums may also be interested in this painting.


### Options for the heritage chattels

- As there is public interest in the heritage chattels, we are seeking your direction on our next steps.
- We recommend you instruct us to work with MCH and KNZ to attempt to reach an agreement to for KNZ to sell the Kahler painting to a New Zealand museum, for example Te Papa.
- 32. If this is not successful, we recommend that the Crown does not look to purchase the Kahler painting, as this would potentially be a significant cost for the Crown. The Protected Objects Act 1975 may apply to this work, which would potentially limit the ability to export the painting out of New Zealand.<sup>1</sup>
- 33. We recommend you instruct us to advise KNZ we have no interest in the remaining heritage chattels. In this case, we expect KNZ will look to sell these items. We have prepared reactive messaging that explains the Crown was compensated for these items when they were sold in 1991.



<sup>1</sup> The Protected Objects Act 1975 does not fully prohibit the export of a protected New Zealand object; however it does require permission from the Chief Executive of the Ministry for Culture and Heritage.



**Description:** Large oil painting on canvas depicting The White Terraces of Lake Rotomahana. Work is mounted in an ornate gilded frame. Matting features small brass plaque with the inscription :"CARL KAHLER The white terraces of Lake Rotomahana painted before being buried by the eruption of Mt Tarawera 1886."

Pieces: 4

Visible drooping across the support of the work. Approximately 0.5cm to 0.75cm of give in the middle section of the canvas where the work is drooping forward in the frame.

Gracking and flaking is evident across the surface of the work. Cracks appear throughout the sections of blue pigment and traverse the face of the work from top proper-left and culminates in heavy cracking and some flaking of blue pigment in top proper-right. Staining/discolouration is evident on top edge, proper right.

Raised pigment and texturing is evident throughout the body of the work, especially on ridges depicting the terraces. Some areas show signs of flaking of

these textured pigments including some heavy chipping where flakes have fallen away and exposed the support throughout the centre of the work.

An unidentified orange accretion is present adhered to the surface of one of the blue pools near the middle of the image.

Heavy flaking is visible in the middle of the lower quarter of the work where the support is clearly visible through missing flakes of pigment. Significant evidence of cracking around this area. Some minor scratches and abrasions visible on lower edge of the face of the work.

Some staining and discolouration on the mat around the inscription plaque, some patina forming on lettering. Some abrasions visible to frame. Surface of work shows evidence of creasing, likely the result of historic re-framing given the uniformity of the crease along all four planes of the work.

<u>Assessment:</u> The overall condition is worn and declining. Object is currently not stored in controlled climate and fluctuating humidity and temperature is having an adverse effect on the work, with an increase in the depth of drooping of the canvas support likely, which will further accentuate the degree of cracking and flaking currently visible in the work. Damage is not irreparable, however the condition can be expected to degrade further, should preventative conservation action not be taken.



<u>Summary of condition/ recommendations</u>: The work is in a state of active deterioration. The cracking and flaking will continue to be exacerbated by the drooping of the work and will likely result in a continued deterioration of the work. It is recommended that the work be stored in a stable environment where the temperature and humidity levels can be maintained at best-practice levels to ensure limited degradation of the canvas supporting the work.

Further recommendations would be to have the work inspected by a certified conservator to prepare a proposal for treatment, possibly to assess the viability to re-stretch the canvas and attend to the areas of active flaking to prevent ongoing degradation.

<u>Significance Assessment:</u> The work depicts the White Terraces, a geological feature of New Zealand which was destroyed in 1886 by volcanic eruption. The work itself sits within the larger setting of The Chateau Tongariro, a building which holds category 1 heritage status in New Zealand. This work has been the centrepiece of the ground lobby for much of The Chateau's life and contributes to the overall historic fabric of the building as a notable part of the visitor experience as a recognised feature of The Chateau.



# Chateau Lease – Removal of KNZ's Chattels

We refer to the **attached** letter dated 4 April 2023 which advised that the Department of Conservation (**DOC**) does not wish to purchase any of KAH New Zealand Limited's (**KNZ**) heritage chattels. The letter also requested that KNZ remove KNZ's chattels from the building as soon as possible.

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We wrote again on 14 April 2023, this time through our lawyer to your lawyer, requesting an update as to when KNZ plans to remove the chattels. Our lawyer suggested that we meet via Teams to discuss. Our lawyer wrote again on 18 April 2023 requesting a discussion and advising that the painting and other chattels need to be removed from the building as soon as possible as the Chateau building will remain unoccupied in the immediate future. Our lawyer followed up with a further email on 20 April 2023.

On 24 April 2023 you agreed through your lawyer that the removal of the chattels, and in particular the Carl Kahler painting, can be resolved separately from any repair and maintenance matters. On 28 April 2023, our lawyer provided your lawyer with photos to illustrate some examples of the KNZ chattels that are still in the building and that need to be removed by KNZ.

Our lawyer phoned and left a message for your lawyer on 11 May 2023. An email response was received on the same day indicating that your lawyer did not have any updates as she is waiting to receive instructions from you. Our lawyer phoned your lawyer again on 30 May 2023 seeking an update as to when the chattels will be removed. Your lawyer informed she was still awaiting instructions from you.

The empty Chateau building is not a good place for the Carl Kahler painting and the other KNZ chattels to be stored. The chattels are still KNZ's property even though they have been left behind after termination of the lease. The chattels are in the Chateau building at KNZ's sole risk.

DOC has provided you with a period of grace to give you time to attend to removal of the chattels. This period of grace needs to come to an end. DOC has no obligation to KNZ to keep the heating on and DOC cannot indefinitely store the KNZ chattels in the Chateau buildings.

DOC requires KNZ to attend to the removal of the KNZ chattels from the Chateau buildings **by 30 June 2023.** 




The KNZ chattels cannot remain in the Chateau buildings. Particularly as we head into winter conditions. By not removing the chattels (including the painting) by the specified date, KNZ will be taken to consent to any relocation of the KNZ chattels on the basis that any such relocation will be entirely at KNZ's cost and risk with no liability whatsoever attaching to DOC in effecting the removal and relocation on KNZ's behalf. icial months in the second



# Subject: Chattels in Chateau Tongariro

# Background

There are currently a large number of items remaining in the Chateau which were left behind when Kah NZ Ltd ended their lease on the Chateau Tongariro. Although the majority of these items have little individual value there some items which have either significant value or are of heritage value. A number of these items also have high public interest in the management and storage of them.

Crown Law have requested on several occasions for these items to be removed by Kah NZ ltd, however they have not responded to these requests. There are concerns that due to the conditions within the Chateau over time these items will incur damage. In addition to the poor environmental conditions the Detailed Seismic Assessment for the building is only 15% NBS which adds additional risk in the event of a seismic event these items may incur damage if left in the building.

The Department has received several requests from the public and media to confirm these items are being appropriately cared for.

# **Proposed Approach**

Due to the disputed nature of these items, where possible it is preferred, they are not removed from site. Therefore, it is recommended we do the following:

Have expert assessments completed on key artwork and heritage fittings and fixtures to ascertain current condition including any immediate repairs which may be required and recommendations for storage.

- Once assessments are completed, package identified items and where possible relocate into the newer part of the Chateau where conditions are more stable and secure.

# Ownership

Ownership of these items remain with Kah NZ Ltd, however there has been no response to letters sent from Crown Law asking for their removal. Work is underway to have these items deemed abandoned however this process could take some time and in the interim, there is a need to protect them from deterioration and damage.

# **Key issues**


Although DOC does not own any of the chattels in the building, it needs to be noted that now the building has been handed back to the Department there is likely to be an expectation by the public that Government will protect items of heritage value for future generations.

Currently there is a high risk these items will deteriorate or be damaged if left in place due to damp and humid conditions in the main original part of the Chateau building.

I have been in contact with internal DOC Heritage advisors, Heritage NZ and the National Library and all have significant concerns if the items remain unprotected.

# **Financial Analysis**

# Recommendations

The key recommendations are as follows:

Rec #	Recommendation
1	Arrange for an art conservator to assess the Carl Kahler painting due to its poor condition and provide recommendations on its storage and any urgent repairs which may be necessary. National Library has recommended Susanne Rawson from HPFS Solutions in New Plymouth.
	Approximate Cost for assessment - \$3,000
2	Arrange for a heritage architect to identify original fittings within the chateau which should be removed and stored to protect them (Eg chandeliers)
	Approximate Cost for assessment - \$5,000
3	Arrange for all artworks listed in earlier table to have professional crates made for their storage and for them to be relocated into the newer wing of the building for protection. Approximate Cost for crates and relocation - \$12,000
4	Arrange for key heritage furniture items listed in earlier table to be wrapped professionally and relocated into newer wing of building for protection. Approximate Cost for wrapping and relocation - \$5,000
5	Arrange for large furniture items such as billiard table and grand piano to be protect them but leave in situ.

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### 3 Updates

#### 3.1 Closure of Chateau Tongariro



- There are artwork and historical artifacts located in the notel that were commissioned when the hotel was owned by the Crown-owned Tourist Hotel Corporation. There are also items that were donated to the Chateau Tongariro by members of the public. We consider items that were in the hotel when KAH NZ took over the lease in 1991 are covered by the lease and should therefore be yielded to DOC along with the buildings and improvements. We understand KAH NZ may hold a view that they own these items.
- We are writing to KAH NZ advising these items should remain with the hotel.
- We are working with Heritage New Zealand Pouhere Taonga to understand if the artwork and historical artifacts form a regionally or nationally significant collection.

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#### 3.2 Closure of Chateau Tongariro hotel





There is a collection of artwork and historic artefacts (historic chattels) including a large, well-known painting of the pink and white terraces believed to have been purchased by THC in the 1970s. Other items were purchased by THC or donated / loaned to the Chateau by members of the public.

- As the Chateau was sold as a going concern in 1991 including all chattels, we understand KNZ own the historic chattels. KNZ have advised us they are interested in the historic chattels remaining with the <u>Chateau</u>, and are looking to sell these items to either the Department, another government agency, or a new lessee in the future.
- We are making an interim arrangement with KNZ to ensure that historic chattels are identified and secured when the lease terminates. KNZ expect us to provide assurance that we will be accountable for any damage or theft of these chattels. We are reviewing whether we can accept this level of risk, including through having insurances in place for high value items or storing them elsewhere.
- Longer term, we will need to consider whether DOC should consider purchasing the historic chattels or continue to carry their risk until a time that the Chateau is leased to another party, if at all. If the Chateau is not leased, or this process takes a long time, KNZ are likely to consider selling the chattels. We will provide you with further advice once we have a greater understanding of these chattels and their value.

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## Standing and priority items

#### 2.1 Closure of Chateau Tongariro hotel

- On 4 April 2023 we advised KAH New Zealand Incorporated (KNZ) that the Grown is not interested in purchasing Chateau Tongariro chattels, and that we would like KNZ to remove their chattels from the premises.
- We have noticed a difference in how the Kahler painting hangs in its frame and have been advised this is likely due to a change in humidity levels and lack of air circulation now the building is no longer in regular use. We advised KNZ of this on 17 April 2023 and recommended they remove the painting urgently from the Chateau to reduce the risk of deterioration.
- KNZ has not yet responded about removing the chattels, including the Kahler painting.

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
## 2 Standing and priority items

#### 2.1 Closure of Chateau Tongariro hotel

- As we advised in the Status Report last week, we have informed KAH New Zealand Incorporated (KNZ) that the Crown is not interested in purchasing Chateau Congariro chattels, and that we would like KNZ to remove their chattels from the premises.
- On 20 April 2023, KNZ's lawyers informed us they are awaiting instructions from their client on this matter. We advised KNZ's lawyers that we consider this is an urgent matter, as we are concerned the paintings may be damaged due to the conditions in Chateau not being optimal for storing artworks. All chattels remaining in the Chateau are there at KNZ's risk.

#### Next steps

We are seeking legal advice on our options regarding high value chattels if KNZ do not make immediate plans to remove them.

### 2 Standing and priority items

#### 2.1 Closure of Chateau Tongariro hotel



- KNZ's legal team have advised us that KNZ are interested in selling the Carl Kahler painting of the pink and white terraces to a public museum. We have provided contact details for the relevant people at Te Papa. Te Papa will need to run their usual acquisitions process, which may take 2-3 months.
  - We released an OIA response to 9(2)(a) on 2 May 2023, which confirmed the Kahler painting is owned by KNZ, and the Crown is not looking to purchase it (OIAD 2844 refers). As this is the first time this information has been made public, there is likely to be media and public interest in the ownership of the painting. We have prepared reactive messages on this matter.



We are continuing to encourage KNZ to remove the Kahler painting, and other items of value, from the Chateau.
