Humpback whale/paikea – identification and information

Length:

Adult: 11.5–16mNewborn: 4–5m

Dorsal fin:

 Small dorsal fin with distinctive hump at the front, located about 2/3 of the way back along the body

Blow:

• Two blowholes

Colouration:

• Blackish upper body, largely white underneath

Body:

- Extremely long flippers
- Knobbly protuberances on head, tip of lower jaw and leading edge of flippers
- Broad tail fluke with unique black and white pattern

Research: If possible take photographs of the dorsal fin and tail fluke, and send them to DOC with your sighting form.

Keep your distance – do not approach closer than 50 m to whales

Sperm whale/parāoa – identification and information

Length:

• Adult: 12-18 m

• Newborn: 3.5-4.5 m

Dorsal fin:

A small low hump

Blow:

 Single slit-like blowhole, on the top left side of the snout

Colouration:

 Purplish-brown or dark grey in colour, with white underneath

Body:

- Large, square head that makes up around 1/3 of the body length
- Females smaller than males with a proportionately smaller head

Research: If possible take photographs of the tail fluke and send them to DOC with your sighting form.

Southern right whale/tohorā - identification and information

Length:

Adult: 11–18 mNewborn: 4.5–6 m

Dorsal fin:

No dorsal fin

Blow:

 Two blowholes that form a V-shaped blow when exhaling

Colouration:

Typically black in colour but can have irregular white patches

Body:

- Strongly arched mouth
- Head and lower jaw are covered with large, white, rough growths on the skin
- Flippers are large and paddle-shaped

Research: If possible take photographs of the growths on the head and send them to DOC with your sighting form.

Keep your distance – do not approach closer than 50 m to whales

Blue whale - identification and information

Length:

Adult: 30 mNewborn: 7 m

Dorsal fin:

• Tiny dorsal fin set well back on the body

Blow:

 Two blowholes that form a tall blow when exhaling

Colouration:

• Grey-blue mottled colour

Body:

- Up to 30m in length
- Extremely long streamlined body, tapering towards the tail
- Flat, U-shaped head with a ridge running down the middle from the blowhole

Research: If possible take photographs of the back including dorsal fin (both sides if possible), and send them to DOC with your sighting form.

Keep your distance – do not approach closer than 50 m to whales

Orca/maki – identification and information

Length:

Adult: 6–8 mNewborn: 2 m

Dorsal fin:

• Male: nearly 2 m tall

• Female: less than 1 m and more curved

Blow:

• Single blowhole

Colouration:

Distinctive black and white markings

Body:

- Large body
- White patch above and behind the eye
- Grey/white saddle patch behind the dorsal fin

Research: If possible take photographs of the dorsal fin and saddle patch (area behind the dorsal fin), and send them to DOC with your sighting form.

False killer whale - identification and information

Length:

Adult: 4.5–6 mNewborn: 1.75 m

Dorsal fin:

Rounded dolphin-like fin

Blow:

Single blowhole

Colouration:

 Almost black in colour with slightly paler areas on the underside

Body:

- Narrow, pointed head
- Long slender body

Note: Sometimes mistaken for pilot whales – see included comparison card for more information.

Research: If possible take photographs of the dorsal fin, and send them to DOC with your sighting form.

Pilot whale/upokohue - identification and information

Length:

Adult: 5–7 mNewborn: 1.8 m

Dorsal fin:

Broad sloping fin with rounded tip

Blow:

Single blowhole

Colouration:

- Largely dark gray with a light gray patch on the chest
- May have a white saddle patch behind the dorsal fin

Body:

- Large bulbous head
- Light gray to white streaks behind the eyes

Note: Sometimes mistaken for false killer whales – see included comparison card for more information.

Research: If possible take photographs of the dorsal fin and saddle patch (area behind the dorsal fin), and send them to DOC with your sighting form.

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False killer or pilot whale? Spot the difference


