Schedule 2 - Not-Protected Wildlife Export Conditions

Interpretation

- 1. The Authority Holder is responsible for the acts and omissions of its employees, contractors or agents. The Authority Holder is liable under this Authority for any breach of the terms of the Authority by its employees, contractors or agents as if the breach had been committed by the Authority Holder.
- 2. Where obligations bind more than one person, those obligations bind those persons jointly and separately.

What is being authorised?

- 3. The Authority Holder is permitted to export the authorised items set out in Schedule 1, Item 1 to the location described in Schedule 1, Item 3. (Authorised Activity)
- 4. The Authority Holder is required to retain and produce, upon request, a copy of this Authority (in physical or digital form) while undertaking the Authorised Activity.
- 5. This Authority must be attached to the air waybill and accompany the authorised item at all times during transport.
- 6. The Authority Holder must ensure that, where applicable to game birds, the species was obtained legally through adherence to the Game Bird Hunting Code of Conduct and all relevant regulations as outlined by <u>Fish & Game New Zealand</u>.

Who is authorised?

- 7. Only the Authority Holder described in Schedule 1, Item 2 is authorised to carry out the Authorised Activity, unless otherwise agreed in writing by the Grantor.
- 8. The Authority Holder must not transfer, sub licence, assign, otherwise dispose of an interest under this Authority or any part of it.

What are the fees and when are they to be paid?

 The Authority Holder must pay the application processing fee to the Grantor in the manner directed by the Grantor (unless the Grantor has advised the processing fee is waived/no processing fee payment is required).

What are the liabilities?

- 10. The Authority Holder agrees to exercise the Authority at the Authority Holder's own risk and releases to the full extent permitted by law the Grantor and the Grantor's employees and agents from all claims and demands of any kind and from all liability which may arise in respect of any accident, damage or injury occurring to any person or property arising from the Authority Holder's exercise of the Authorised Activity.
- 11. The Authority Holder must indemnify the Grantor against all claims, actions, losses and expenses of any nature which the Grantor may suffer or incur or for which the Grantor may become liable arising from the Authority Holder's exercise of the Authorised Activity.
- 12. This indemnity is to continue after the expiry or termination of this Authority in respect of any acts or omissions occurring or arising before its expiry or termination.

What about compliance with legislation and Grantor's notices and directions?

13. The Authority Holder must comply with all statutes, bylaws and regulations, and all notices, directions and requisitions of the Grantor and any competent authority relating to the conduct of the Authorised Activity. Without limitation, this includes the Conservation Act 1987 and the Acts listed in the First Schedule of that Act and all applicable health and safety legislation and regulations.

When can the Authority be terminated?

- 14. The Grantor may at any time terminate this Authority, in whole or in part, if:
 - a. the Authority Holder breaches any of the conditions of this Authority; or
 - b. in the Grantor's opinion, the carrying out of the Authorised Activity causes or is likely to cause any unforeseen or unacceptable effects.
- 15. If the Grantor intends to terminate this Authority, in whole or in part, the Grantor must give the Authority Holder such prior notice as, in the sole opinion of the Grantor, appears reasonable and necessary in the circumstances.

How are notices sent and when are they received?

- 16. Any notice to be given under this Authority is to be in writing and made by personal delivery, by pre-paid post or email to the receiving party at the address or email address provided by the Authority Holder. Any such notice is to be deemed to have been received:
 - a. in the case of personal delivery, on the date of delivery.
 - b. in the case of post, on the 3rd working day after posting;
 - c. in the case of email, on the date receipt of the email is acknowledged by the addressee by return email or otherwise in writing.
- 17. If either party's details change then the party whose details change must within 5 working days of such change provide the other party with the changed details.

Can this Authority be varied?

18. The Grantor may at any time review and/or vary the conditions of this Authority if any conditions contained in this Authority are breached or for any other reason that the Grantor may decide.

The Law

- 19. This Authority is to be governed by and interpreted in accordance with the laws of New Zealand.
- 20. This Authority is not a substitute for a CITES permit or certificate under the Trade in Endangered Species Act 1989. If the authorised item being exported is from a species listed under the Trade in Endangered Species Act 1989, a valid CITES permit under that Act must be obtained prior to export.
