Tēnā koe

Thank you for your request to the Department of Conservation, received on 16 June 2025, in which you stated:

I am astonished by this initiative by the Department of Conservation to actively remove large numbers of native species from a fully protected marine reserve, because of some perception that the fluctuation in urchin numbers is somehow unnatural and needs to "managed." Surely, a key function of marine reserves is to act as ecological baselines for comparison with areas that are impacted by activities such as fishing - so in this regard this marine reserve has been compromised. As a marine scientist that has applied for permission to undertake sampling in marine reserves, I have dealt with detailed scrutiny over small sample sizes, yet in this case massive quantities of animals have been removed with express purpose of causing ecological changes - I simply don't understand the remarkably contradictory nature of the Department's behaviour, especially in terms of the Act itself which is for the "purpose of preserving them in their natural state as the habitat of marine life for scientific study".

I would like to request all material relating to the permit that allowed this activity to proceed, especially the criteria against it was assessed in relation to the legal obligations of the Marine Reserves Act, which I presume are included in the briefing to the decision maker in the department.

We have considered your request under the Official Information Act 1982.

For clarity, we have interpreted your request as being for information provided, or evidence used, to support the decision to undertake trial removals of long-spined sea urchins from the Poor Knights Marine Reserve. This includes evidence provided to Fisheries New Zealand.

The long-spined sea urchin is considered a native pest, which the Department of Conservation has a remit to manage under the Biosecurity New Zealand Pest Management National Plan of Action 2011. The Department does not need to apply for permits it would otherwise grant. Therefore, only a permit from Fisheries New Zealand was acquired for the trial removals of long-spined sea urchins at the Poor Knights Marine Reserve.

Careful consideration was taken in relation to these trials. To ensure due diligence, the Department evaluated the technical and cultural advice relating to the removals, and a decision to proceed was made by the Director Operations Northern North Island and Director Biodiversity System and Aquatic as joint decision makers. The Department's current focus is on monitoring the progress of the trials. No management actions are planned at this time.
