Tēnā koe

Thank you for your request to the Department of Conservation (DOC), received on 03 April 2025, in which you asked for:

- *The Save the Kiwi proposal for the translocation of kiwi from Ponui to Waiheke*
- *The DOC permission document for this project.*
- *All communications between DOC and external third parties related to this project. This might include but not be restricted to Save the Kiwi.*
- *All communications that relate to consultation with community, in particular Save the Kiwi consultation with Hauraki Islands F&B.*
- *All communications that relate to the decision to translocate kiwi from Ponui rather than other areas ie: Coromandel.*

We have considered your request under the Official Information Act 1982 (the OIA).

On 10 April 2025 you refined your request to:

- *DOC permission for the translocation*
- *Release a copy of the Save the Kiwi translocation proposal*
- *Provide copies of the recovery group advice memos around the source site for the kiwi i.e. Ponui vs other sites*
- *Provide copies of community consultation records we have on file around dog management and the risks that have been considered by DOC.*

By way of context for my response I can advise you of the following.

- On 11 April 2025 the Department approved the translocation proposal from co-applicants The Kiwi Trust (trading as Save the Kiwi), Ngāti Pāoa Iwi Trust and Ngāi Tai ki Tāmaki to introduce kiwi from Pōnui to privately-owned land on Te Matuku Peninsula on Waiheke (the peninsula to the west of Te Matuku Bay).
- Approval was granted to translocate 10 kiwi in year one (2025) and up to 40 birds throughout the period 2026 – 2028. The total number of kiwi transferred at the end of Year 3 is not to exceed 50 kiwi. Conditions for monitoring are outlined in the permit and include monitoring with transmitters for 20 adult/subadult kiwi for at least 3 years.
- One of the proposed permit conditions is that if 30% of kiwi released onto Waiheke through the translocation are killed through predation, attack or human interference we will pause further translocations and review.

- The risks to kiwi on Waiheke are understood by the Department and whilst there is a level of risk to kiwi from dogs on Waiheke the Department considers that the mitigations that have been put in place are sufficient at this stage.
- Save the Kiwi has been leading consultation on Waiheke regarding dog management and risks to kiwi, and the following programmes of work are underway:
 - Auckland Council's Animal Management unit is supporting the release of kiwi on Waiheke in a number of ways. This includes proactive engagement with Waiheke dog owners to remind them of their responsibilities under the Dog Control Act 1996 including to not allow their dogs to disturb or threaten any protected wildlife. Nearly all native bird species are fully protected under the Wildlife Act 1953, and Waiheke is already home to a number of 'Threatened' and 'At Risk' species with important roosting and breeding sites across the island.
 - With the anticipated release of kiwi, the island's dedicated Animal Management Officer (AMO) has been visiting property-owners surrounding the area of the release, ensuring they are aware of the need to keep their dogs from roaming and directing them towards bird aversion training.
 - Members of Council's Proactive Animal Management team have also been on the island giving educational talks in schools and were at the recent Wilderfest event alongside Save the Kiwi, Te Korowai o Waiheke and others.
 - At the time of and following the release, the island's Animal Management Officer will be carrying out increased proactive patrols around the main kiwi release site. Specific areas on Waiheke have designated rules for dogs, such as on leash requirements and prohibited zones to protect the community and wildlife.
 - Save the Kiwi has also connected with Waiheke Tourism, who are helping to reach out to accommodation providers and other stakeholders about the arrival of kiwi on Waiheke and what this means for responsible dog ownership. In addition, the Waiheke Pet Advocacy Group has prepared this video for the ferries: [Responsible Pet Ownership Video](#)
 - Auckland Transport is supportive and has agreed to install yellow kiwi road signs with the message "Caution at night" on key roads near the release site.
 - DOC staff have met with the Waiheke Local Board to discuss the risks as well as speaking with staff from Auckland Council and Waiheke Bird Rescue.

With all these measures in place, and with the support of the Waiheke community, I am confident that the return of kiwi to Waiheke will be a success. To be able to even consider having taonga species such as kiwi returned to Waiheke is a mark of the success of Te Korowai o Waiheke and many others, including land owners, who are working towards a predator-free Waiheke and the restoration of its environment.

The schedule of documents I have decided to release in response to your request is attached. Information which is deemed out of scope of the request has been marked 'out of scope'.

I have decided to release the relevant parts of the documents listed in the Document schedule, subject to information being withheld under one or more of the following sections of the OIA, as applicable:

- personal information, under section 9(2)(a) – to protect the privacy of natural persons, including deceased people.
- free and frank expression under section 9(2)(g)(i) – to maintain the effective conduct of public affairs.

In making my decision, I have considered the public interest considerations in section 9(1) of the OIA and determined there are no public interests that outweigh the grounds for withholding.

You are entitled to seek an investigation and review of my decision by writing to an Ombudsman as provided by section 28(3) of the OIA.
