"To conserve and interpret the historic Bach Communities on Rangitoto Island for the benefit of all New Zealanders."

The Rangitoto Island Historic Conservation Trust (RIHCT) was formed in 1997 in response to the impending demolition of a significant number of heritage baches on the island. The Trust advocated for the Rangitoto Bach settlements to be recognised as irreplaceable artefacts of New Zealand's architectural and social history.

Today, the Trust works to retain the original character of the baches and makes them available for members of the public to experience. They work alongside the Department of Conservation and Iwi, to restore, preserve and maintain the Bach communities, manage a museum and provide interpretational material. They also archive information about the Bach settlements and the communities that built them.

RIHCT Milestones and Achievements to date:

- Trust formed in July 1997.
- Signed a Memorandum of Understanding with the Department of Conservation in August 1999.
- Received Trust of the Year Award from the New Zealand Trustees Association for 2000.
- Professional documentation of the Bach Communities and development of a research archive, including over 50 oral histories and 300 photographs stored in perpetuity at Auckland Council Libraries. Supported by grants from the Lottery Grants Board.

The trusts' charitable purpose

To conserve and interpret the historic Bach Communities on Rangitoto Island for the benefit of all New Zealanders. The Trust works to retain the original character of the baches and makes them available for the public to experience. We have worked alongside the Department of Conservation and Iwi, to provide this unique opportunity to all New Zealanders.

The Trusts aspirations are to restore, market and manage the baches for public to use on Rangitoto Island and to raise funds before the purpose of reinvestment into the Islands historic Bach communities.

Concession Description

RIHCT will engage the services of a Bach manager/onsite host who will manage overnight accommodation in historic buildings on Rangitoto Island. The Overnight Rangitoto concession will have two main focuses:

1. **Overnight Accommodation** To promote and market up to four specific baches for use as historic overnight accommodation by members of the general public

2. **Onsite Maintenance & Restoration** – Monitor and maintain the heritage fabric of the buildings to ensure longevity of the assets.

The Bach managers will operate on behalf of RIHCT whose mission is "to conserve and interpret the historic Bach Communities on Rangitoto Island for the benefit of all New Zealanders."

Bach 103, the Flounder Inn, at Gardeners Gap will be restored for overnight use while providing temporary accommodation of 292 days per year for the onsite managers. The onsite managers will endeavour to induct visitors into Island life by meeting and greeting the guests with a verbal overview of the Island and Bach history

Why RIHCT should be awarded this concession

The trust has a track record of over 20 years of service to Rangitoto Island and the conservation of the Bach communities. The Trusts intention is to continue to reinvest in the restoration and ongoing maintenance of Rangitoto Island. This will be done by purchasing construction materials for Bach restoration and by providing volunteer labour to assist with routine maintenance tasks. This will enable overnight opportunities for members of the public and return life and vibrancy to heritage fabric on Island.

Vegetation clearance Bach access tracks and surrounds will need regular vegetation clearance to maintain the facilities i.e., toilet access, patio, structure edges, view shafts.

Vegetation which surrounds the heritage assets include -200 species of moss, plants and trees including the largest Pohutukawa forest in the world.

Adverse:

Vegetation clearance, to maintain access-ways and views open, may damage indigenous biodiversity.

Positive:

Vegetation clearance around heritage buildings will prolong the life of the asset and reduce workload of DOCs Island rangers or contractors.

- RIHCT will seek out information relating to threatened and endangered plant species which may exist near Bach sites.
- Vegetation trimming will only occur where necessary to maintain existing walkways and views.
- Any significant vegetation clearance would be discussed and approved in writing by DOC prior to any works commencing.
- During the welcome induction Bach visitors will be asked to keep to the formed tracks and patio area. They will also be told that collecting vegetation is not permitted.
- A Volunteer botanist can access and photograph vegetation surrounding the Bach sites on an annual basis if required. Effort could be put into identifying the location and health of threatened or rare plants.

Recreation/ enjoyment of Bach communities

The caretakers of other Baches on Rangitoto value sole occupation of their classic holiday homes.

Positive;

This application will open up historic assets which were otherwise closed to public access.

Limiting the number of people to each Bach via the booking system will reduce overcrowding.

- RIHCT will promote and educate visitors on the overnight facilities available and warn of the risk of island fire. No open flames including candles and charcoal burners will be enforced.
- RIHCT will continue to maintain the heritage assets and ensure that guests respect island visitors and leased baches by keeping noise levels to a minimum.

The proposal is in keeping with the areas existing recreation opportunities and historic setting.

Negative as noted by RIBCA 2017:

- -the danger of fire is everpresent on Rangitoto and could affect not only the rented Bach but also neighbouring baches (which are uninsurable) as well as the island's vegetation. The absence of a fire brigade and readily accessible pressurised water heightens this risk. The risk comes from bonfires, candles, fireworks and solid fuel BBOs.
- -loud music and noisy parties
- -Bach renters should respect the rights of the occupiers of the baches under family guardianship.

- RIHCTs Bach managers will ensure the overnight party size is limited to a maximum number of people – the max number of occupants will be set by the total number of beds present in the Bach. This will be consistent with the recreational setting, and historic use of the facility.
- RIHCT will make the baches available for use by other concessionaires or stakeholders when requested.
- 'RICHT reserves the right to offer discounted accommodation to descendants of family members of Bach owners and to those who partake in community work on the island for the trust.'
